At the start of this month, our efforts have been focused on ensuring the safety of students as they return to school. Our daily foot patrols during the mornings and afternoons have significantly decreased robberies, especially in the Purley area.

Purley and Woodcote, Kenley and Purley Oaks and Riddlesdown officers have attended Purley Festival where we had a great time and opportunity to engage with local residents.

Throughout The month we were highly visible in Kenley Common and Aerodrome mainly for engagement but also to prevent ASB.

ASB in Kenley SNT

We have received reports of anti-social behaviour in and around Bourne Park.

In response, we are conducting regular foot patrols and mobile patrols to address this issue.

Our operations will continue until we see concrete improvements. We expect everyone to show consideration for others when organizing their daily activities. Furthermore, driving motor vehicles in green spaces is strictly illegal, and individuals caught doing so will be held accountable.



Shoplifting

We have been collaborating with our Licensing Team to address the issue of shoplifting. This problem has significantly impacted businesses in Purley and the CO-OP in Kenley. Our efforts have led to the seizure of stolen goods from off-license corner shops. It's important to note that buying or receiving stolen goods is an offence, and individuals engaging in this activity risk critical conviction.

Further to the above, we have made few arrests of a regular offenders from CO-OP.

Domestic Abuse

What is domestic abuse?

Domestic abuse can include threats, violence, and coercive or controlling behaviour between people who have a relationship with each other (or have had in the past).

It can happen to anyone regardless of gender, sexuality, culture or religion.

It's based on one person having power or control over another, and it can worsen over time.

This can include but isn't limited to the following types of abuse:

- violent
- psychological
- financial
- emotional
- sexual

Domestic abuse also includes honour-based abuse and forced marriage. The Crown Prosecution Service website has a breakdown of the types of domestic abuse. Just one incident counts as abuse.

How to report domestic abuse

If you are suffering from domestic abuse, you're not to blame for what's happening. You're not alone.

Our first priority is to protect you and any children you have. If the situation is an emergency an officer will attend and, if appropriate to do so, arrest the perpetrator, and take action to protect you from further harm – giving you time to think.

You can report it to us or, if you're not ready to speak to the police, you can contact support organisations who will help you.

If you have a hearing or speech impairment, use our textphone service **18000** or text us on **999** if you've pre-registered with the emergency SMS service.

Other ways to report:

- by calling **101** (If you have a hearing or speech impairment, use our textphone service on **18001 101**)
- in the safety of your local police station (if you require a translator, we can provide someone initially by phone and later in person)

In an emergency, dial **999**, or dial **101** in non-emergency.

Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme (DVDS) Clare's Law

'Clare's Law' gives members of the public a right to ask police if they are concerned that their partner or former partner may pose a risk to them. You can also ask about the partner of someone you know. Members of the public can make a request under Clare's Law at police stations or at www.met.police.uk
